Required 4 levels of languages by declared AREA

Be aware that not all levels of languages may be taught for all semesters. Be sure to plan accordingly if you are starting a new language. If you wish to have your placement evaluated, please see the appropriate department that administers the language you want to pursue.

INTS students are strongly urged to continue developing their language fluency each semester of their college career, even beyond the major's required total of six levels of language study. Optimally, INTS students will pursue six levels (required) or more of a language appropriate to their declared area.

- If a student chooses to pursue 4 levels of one language and 2 levels of another language (to fill the required 6 levels for the major), the 4-levels of language **must** correspond to your declared area.
- If a student wants to declare ASIA as an AREA, he/she must be aware that French can only be used for a supporting 2-levels of language. Students with ASIA as declared AREA must take at least 4 levels of an appropriate Asian language.
- If a student begins in one area with one set of language levels and wants to change to another AREA which requires a different "core" language (for example, the switch from SPAN language/LATN area to ASIA area) he/she must have this change approved by the director of INTS.

AFRICA Arabic, French, Kiswahili, Portuguese
