No more than 45 hours of Economics courses may count toward graduation. <u>ECON 101 or equivalent is a prerequisite to all ECON courses numbered above the 100-level.</u></p> <p>(#) STOR 155 and BUSI 410 together may substitute for ECON 400, but an additional ECON course >400 must be taken. **Prerequisite for ECON 400 and 410 is MATH 152, 231, STOR 112, or 113. <i>Beginning in Fall 2016, STOR 155 will be also be a prerequisite for ECON 400.</i></p> <p>(##) University graduation credit will be given for only one course in each of the following sets of courses: 310 and 410, 320 and 420, 320 and 420/423, 330 and 430, 340 and 440, 345 and 445, 380 and 480. Only ≥ 400 level courses count in the major. Beginning in Fall 2016, ECON 400 will be a prerequisite for all ECON courses > 420.</p> <p>(###) For majors in the department's honors program, the minimum is eight economics courses rather than seven courses in addition to ECON 101. The same provisions apply, except that ECON 691H and 692H must constitute two of the eight courses.</p> <p>ECON 698 will count for 400-level credit only if ECON 384 has been taken; ECON 698 alone will not apply toward major.</p>
