Language Requirement for Major

Global Studies students are strongly urged to continue developing their language fluency each semester of their college career, even beyond the major's required total of six levels of language study. Optimally, students will pursue six levels (required) or more of a language appropriate to their declared area.

If a student chooses to pursue 4 levels of one language and 2 levels of another language (to fill the required 6 levels for the major), the 4-levels of language **must** correspond to their declared area. For example: Students with ASIA as the declared area must take at least 4 levels of an appropriate Asian language. A non-Asian language can only be used for the supporting 2-levels of language.

AFRICA Arabic, French, Kiswahili and Portuguese (6 or more levels offered @ UNC). Dutch (5 levels @ offered at UNC). Lingala (4 levels offered @UNC), Wolof (4 levels offered @UNC).

ASIA Chinese, Hindi-Urdu, Japanese and Korean (6 or more levels offered @ UNC). Turkish (4 levels offered @ UNC).

LATIN AMERICA Spanish, Portuguese (6 or more levels offered @ UNC).

MIDDLE EAST Arabic, Modern Hebrew (6 or more levels offered @ UNC). Persian, Turkish (4 levels offered @ UNC)

RUSSIA/EASTERN EUROPE Russian, Czech, Hungarian, Polish, Serbo-Croatian (6 or more levels offered @ UNC).

WESTERN EUROPE/EUROPEAN UNION French, German, Italian, Portuguese, Spanish (6 or more levels offered at UNC). Dutch (5 levels offered at UNC). Greek is also an appropriate language but Greek language courses taught at UNC are Classical Greek, not the modern, spoken Greek language pertinent to the GLOBL major. Modern Greek is taught at Duke.
