Students are admitted to the Pharm.D. program (the four-year program of professional studies) in the UNC Eshelman School of Pharmacy upon completion of at least two years (the pre-pharmacy years) of collegiate work in the General College of UNC-Chapel Hill or at any accredited institution of higher learning in the United States. Criteria for admission include satisfactory completion (with a grade of C- or better) of all pre-pharmacy courses prior to beginning the pharmacy program. Other considerations for admission include overall quality of academic performance in pre-pharmacy courses, Pharmacy College Admissions Test (PCAT) scores, interview scores, involvement in extracurricular activities, and two letters of recommendation.

Advising-related inquiries can be addressed to the Office of Student Affairs in Beard Hall 109 (pharmacy.unc.edu/about-us/school-organization/student-affairs).

The PCAT is offered every year in the summer, fall, and spring at many testing centers throughout the United States. Applicants must take the PCAT no later than November of the year they are applying.

A minimum of 60 academic hours of credit is required for admission to the School of Pharmacy. Applicants for admission to the PharmD program are also required to take the Pharmacy Admission Test (PCAT). All students are urged to consult the Pharmacy admissions website (<http://www.pharmacy.unc.edu/admissions>) and to attend an open house (pre-registration required) for more details about the application process.
