Core Requirements ♦ (8 Courses)				

♦ 18 hours ≥ C (not C-) required in major core. No more than 45 hours in any subject may be used toward 120 hours for graduation. The interdisciplinary studies major, designed by the student and the student's faculty sponsor, is for students who wish to develop a major outside those offered by the departments and curricula belonging to the College of Arts and Sciences. The degree program consists of eight courses, which must be chosen from at least three departments (with a maximum of four courses from any one department) and which must be appropriate for juniors and seniors majoring in those departments. The courses should form a coherent major to which the student is able to assign a title. Additionally, students are encouraged to select electives and General Education courses that complement the eight courses chosen for the major.

With permission of the relevant professional school, a student may use up to 12 hours of professional courses (e.g., in business administration, media and journalism, information and library science, public health, education) in the IDST major. This can be advantageous to students who want some concentration in these areas but who also want a degree in arts and sciences.
